bolting their party Democrats ticket to vote for republican electors for the presidency, but yet desirous of designation of a highway from Putdemocratic nominees for state offices were assured that such action would not make their votes illegal in a pronounced issue Friday by Alvin S. Moody of Houston, state chairman for the anti-Smith democrats of Texas from the headquarters in the Southland Hotel.

Moody's assurance is based on an opinion he received from Attorney General Claude Pollard, which was offered on the strenght of a sample ballot submitted Pollard by Moody after Moody had marked it for republicans and for democrats.

This of course, would necessitate running a line through the entire ticket of any

Highway Commissioner, on Mon-IS RULED LEGAL Ely, Highway Commissioner, on Monday of this week relative to the Highway situation in Callahan County. As developed in the meeting at Cross, Plains recently, representatives of Cross Plains and Putnam have made an application to the Commission for a costing those same ballots for the nam to Cross Plains and thence to Brownwood. However, before the date of their application the Baird citizens and others had made an application for the designation of the highway from Albany through Baird to Coleman. At the conference Monday Judge Ely made it known definitely that he would not recommend both of these designations but he suggested that as a compromise, he would recommend a designation of a Highway rom Cross Plains to Baird and thence to Albany. This designation, however, would be made absolutely on the condition that a county-wide bond issue be voted. As was suggested by Judge Russell the County Bond issue would be for \$1,000.000.00. Judge Russell said that after taking up the outstanding Bonds and building the Highway from the Brown County line to Cross Plains and thence to Baird there would probably remain enough money to build a gravel road from Cross Plains to Putnam and to the Shackelford County line; from Clyde to Oplin, from Oplin to Cross Plains, from Baird South to the Coleman County line and other necessary roads. This matter, however, of what roads were to be gravelled and how much money there would be available for such purpose was not worked out in detail. If the designation, however, is made as outlined above before a county wide issue will be voted upon these matters will be worked out and it will be definitely determined where the money is to be spent.

Judge Ely further stated that he would not recommend a designation of the highway from Cross Plains to i rown wood unless the proposed highway from Brownwood to Rising Star was abandoned. He did say however, that if said May road was discontinued he would recommend that the Cross Plains and Brownwood road be designated highway. But that, if said May road was not discontinued he might recommend that highway No. 22, from Temple to Comanche be extended to Cross Plains through Rising Star and thence to Baird as mentioned above.





CALLAHAN CO. COURT HOUSE BONDS SOLD

(Baird Star)

Commissioners Court was in session last Tuesday to receive bids on the \$125,000.00, 5 per cent Court House bond issue. Sixteen bids were submitted and the bonds sold to Caldwell & Co., of Nashville, Tennessee, at a premium of \$102 62-100, they being the highest bidders. The Total premuim on the bonds was \$3,264.00 or \$128.264.00 cash for the bonds.

Judge White and Commissioners are proceeding carefully in the sale of the bonds and consider plans for the new Court House and contract to build, and well they may, for Callahan County got "flim-flamed" on the two Court Houses previously built. The two courts that built the other two, two courts that built the other, two were composed of honest, upright men, we knew every one of them personally, but architects or contractors managed to put something over them in the construction of both buildings. We want to warn the court in time to look after the foundation, see that it is deep enough that it, goes down to hard pap.

It was easy to see why the walls of the first stone building cracked. The foundation was not over 2 1-2 feet deep at deepest place, and shallowest, less than a foot and it was discovered when the walls were torn down that the walls did not have half as many headers to bind the walls together as called for by the specifications. The contractor, not the architect was to blame for this fraud. No wonder the walls began to crack before three months.

The present building seemed to have a good deep foundation, but something is wrong some where, or the building would not have cracked like it has. The Court should exercise the same care that the Trustees of the Baird Independent School District did in constructing the old brick school building, one of the best brick building in Callahan County today, after 18 years in use. The trustees of which the writer was a member, selected Grant Bowlus and the late W. A. Hinds, both home men and expert builders and they did the job right. Grapt Bowuls built the Methodist Church building, and did a good honest job. There are so many ways in which contractors, if they are so minded to do, can throw off in constructing brick or stone walls; leave out proper amount of cement, selecting cheap sand and many things to save expense, and the defect is never discovered until contractor has colleced his money and gone. Two main things as we see it is absolutely essential to constructing a lastig brick or stone building: a deep foundation and the right kind of morter but first of all, after you get a good plan is to select an honest, conscientious contractor. There are plenty of contractors, but all are not that kind. A contractor that

will throw in a shovel full of dry sand to fill up a cavety, when mortor is called for in a brick or stone wall to save money. The lowest bidder is oak. not alway the best, often the worst in to make a fair profit on his work. There are plenty of contractors that take a pride in doing honest jobs behonest job, if they stay in business We hope the Commissioner's can se ceure that kind of a contractor. Had the first court house built been honest ly constructed, the second and third court houses would not have had to be built. This is worth thinking serto the tax payors of this couty. We have had two failures in court house building. It is up to the present Commissioners Court to see that the third is properly buit and we believe this court will avoid the errors known to be fatal to the first two court houses. There is no reason why a brick or wall properly constructed, should not last a century. Many buildings in the eastern part of this country 100 years ago are good as ever. England has stone buildings constructed more than a thousand years ago still in use. If we get a public building to last 25 years we think we are doing fine. Let's build a court house that will not have to be rebuilt in the next two generations at the very best

The Star building, a frame wooden building, was built 15 years before the present court house was rebuilt with material of the first, and still in use. A stone building properly constructed ought to out last any wooden build-


