





Ring Wear

Honing is often satisfactory for .0025, .003 and .005 Standard Oversizes. For larger Standard Oversizes honing alone is seldom economical and efficient. When the ring wear is greater than .005 we recommend STORMIZING, as honing alone cannot be depended upon to keep walls perpendicular to crankshaft.

The walls of the cylinders are amply heavy to stand two borings. .075 to .125 can be removed with safety, as the average thickness of a cylinder wall is approximately .250 or 1/4 of an inch to .312 or 5-16 of an inch, and removing metal enough to harely clean up the worn area of the cylinder will not weaken the wall to any extent. Two borings can be accomplished in most cases by removing .020 to .030 of metal.
